

## St. Thomas Aquinas High School Summer Reading 2025


The goals of the Summer Reading Program at STA are to enhance the reading life of our students, expand the curriculum, and promote the belief that reading is one of life's great pleasures. To that end, the Summer Reading Program consists of two parts. One is required of all students, while the other is optional and open to any student who might enjoy reading some of our faculty and staff's favorite books, while earning extra credit in any class they will take this fall.

Part I - The REQUIRED Book: Each student is required to read ONE book designated by grade level. The books for each grade level have been chosen by one of the academic departments and will be discussed at the beginning of the school year in a given class. All 9th-grade students will read the same book for science class; all 10th-grade students will read the same book for theology; all 11th-grade students will read the same book for English.

**NOTE**: You will take a test on the <u>required</u> book during the first week of school next fall.

Grade 9: *Jurassic Park* by Michael Crichton

**Reading Guide** 




In 1990, Michael Crichton introduced the world to Dr. Hammond, an eccentric multimillionaire who builds a theme park with genetically reengineered dinosaurs. The book focuses on a wonderful mixture of science and fantasy, the borders of which are hard to discern. The infusion of chaos theory adds a great deal of scientific relevance and debate to the story.

Since 1990, a great deal has happened in the world of biotechnology and genetic engineering. Somatic cell nuclear transfer was used to create Dolly, the first cloned sheep in 1996. Subsequently, scores of other organisms have been cloned. The human genome has been mapped (completed in 2003). Other genomes continue to be mapped at a rapid pace thanks to technological advances in gene sequencing. There is now discussion about de-extinction projects where extinct organisms are brought back through cloning and genetic engineering. Genome editing with CRISPR is accelerating all aspects of genetic engineering. Is *Jurassic Park* becoming more of a reality than we thought possible?


Using *Jurassic Park* as a background, science teachers will engage students in studies dealing with systems and chaos theory, the reality of 21st-century genetics, and the moral and ethical questions raised by these technologies.

### "Do you know the real story of the Bible?

What do Adam and Eve, Moses, David, Jesus, and the Apostles have to do with my life?

In *The Real Story*, Edward Sri and Curtis Martin break open the Word to examine how all these pieces fit together into one cohesive narrative—a story of how, little by little, God has drawn His people into closer union with Himself, culminating in the coming of Jesus Christ and the establishment of His Church.

Through a closer study of the key characters and events in the larger biblical narrative, Sri and Martin show that the Bible ultimately isn't a collection of disjointed stories, but an epic saga of God's infinite love for us and His perfect plan for our salvation since the beginning of time."

This engaging and accessible book will also help sophomores build a strong foundation for Scripture 1 and 2, giving them the tools to understand salvation history, recognize key themes across both Old and New Testaments, and approach the Bible with confidence and curiosity.

The Narrative of the Life of Frederick Douglass is the true story of how Frederick Douglass escaped from slavery and became a powerful voice against it. In this book, he describes the cruel treatment of enslaved people and shows how slavery harmed both those who were enslaved and those who owned slaves. His story connects to Catholic Social Teaching by emphasizing the dignity of every person, the need to stand together against injustice, and the responsibility to help those who are suffering. Readers should know that the book includes descriptions of violence and language that may be upsetting, as it reflects the realities of the time. However, reading Douglass's story helps us understand the past, think about the importance of justice, and admire his courage and determination.

The Things They Carried by Tim O'Brien is a powerful collection of interconnected stories about a platoon of American soldiers fighting on the ground in the Vietnam War. The novel aligns with Catholic Social Teaching principles, particularly human dignity and solidarity, through its portrayal of soldiers bearing both physical and emotional burdens during wartime. The story follows Lieutenant Jimmy Cross and his platoon as they navigate the physical weight of their military equipment and the psychological weight of their experiences, fears, and memories. The narrative particularly emphasizes the sanctity of human life and the moral complexity of war, showing how each soldier's dignity remains intact despite the dehumanizing nature of combat. This masterful work serves as a meditation on the true cost of war and the essential humanity that persists even in the darkest circumstances.

### PART II -- The OPTIONAL Books: Faculty and Staff Favorites

The second component is optional. Any student may choose to read a book from the list of "Faculty and Staff Favorites." In September, you will complete an assessment on the book(s) you read, to be given by the teacher who nominated the book. At that time, you will choose to have your score count as **extra credit in any subject you wish.** (For example, you might read Mr. Holtz's book, but have it count for your English class.) The extra credit grade will allow you to earn up to 5 points or percentage points (based on the teacher's grading system), which will be applied on an assessment for the first quarter. This has the potential of increasing the one assessment grade up half a letter grade.

**NOTE**: \*\*Only THREE books may be used for extra credit, but you can read as many books as you wish!


### Mr. Bishop Gilead by Marilynne Robinson Fiction




### Mr. Cunningham I Must Betray You by Ruta Sepetys Fiction
